

- Q.2. A 40 years old woman complains of watery, itchy, swollen red eyes with muco-purulent discharge. What important conditions can create this problem? How can you manage?
 - Q.3. A 47 years old lady complains of foreign body sensation in right eye. On opening the lids she has photophobia with pain and lacrimation. On examination the cornea shows ulcer formation on the surface. How will you manage left eye mature cataract of the patient?
 - Q.4. A 67 years old man is referred to you complaining of reduced vision. The best corrected vision is R 6/18, L 6/60. Your findings include bilateral white pupils. Enumerate causes of leucocoria. How will you manage left eye (mature cataract of the patient?
